WHAT IS ENERGY CONSERVATION AND WEATHERIZATION?

- The Energy Conservation Program lowers household energy costs.
- SCS Energy Conservation consists of the Weatherization Assistance Program, the utility-managed Home Energy Assistance Program, and the LIHEAP Building Weatherization Program.
- An energy audit finds opportunities for energy saving improvements and ways to increase energy efficiency, comfort, and safety.
- An energy auditor tests for air leaks and heat loss; examines heating and electric costs due to inefficient appliances; determines the health of a refrigerator, hot water heater, and heating system; tests for carbon monoxide and gas leaks; and checks electric panels and wiring for safety.



HOW CAN THE PROGRAM LOWER ENERGY COSTS AND IMPROVE SAFETY?

- Insulates and air seals
- Repairs or replaces inefficient/unsafe hot water heaters, refrigerators, and heating systems
- Installs smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
- Provides humidity control in problem areas, such as bathrooms
- Installs LED bulbs, water saving low-flow shower and faucet heads



WHAT ENERGY CONSERVATION IS NOT

- It is not an emergency program.
- It is not a home repair or rehabilitation program (examples: roof and window replacement, plumbing leaks, septic system repair, cement pads, electricity/wiring issues).

HOW DO I APPLY?

- All applicants must complete a fuel assistance application with the Energy Services team to be deemed income eligible.
- Once a household is enrolled in the Fuel/Electric Assistance Program, they are income-eligible for the Energy Conservation Program.
- Each applicant must complete a Client Questionnaire and contact the Energy Conservation Office Program Assistant at 603.719.4159 or email kfield@scshelps.org.



ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- There is a waiting list for the program, and, on average, we complete 50 to 75 homes each year. Due to high demand, you may need to wait longer than one year for an energy audit.
